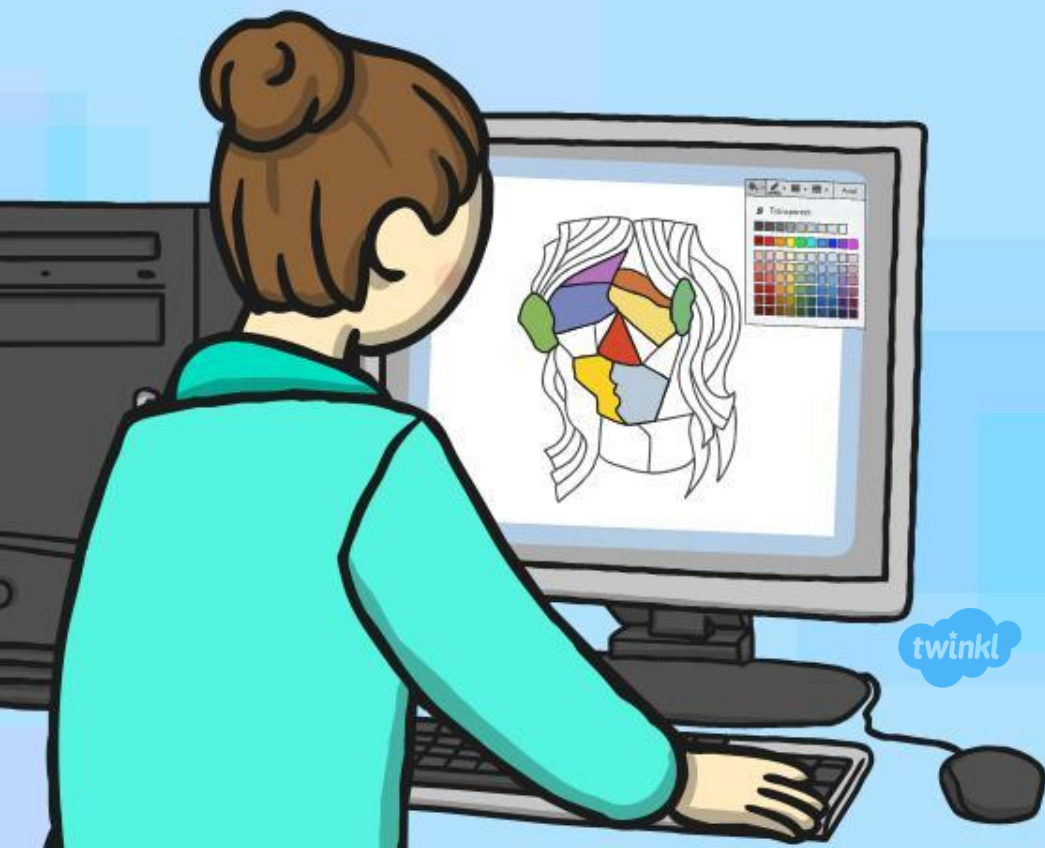


Creating a Masterpiece!



This half term's unit in Computing is **Computer Art** and each week we have focused on a different artist and learnt new skills to recreate each style on the Computer or other device you have at home. This week we will be combining the styles of at least two artists to create our own artwork using a range of skills. The PowerPoint gives you information and instructions to create your very own masterpiece! You can create this on any program of your choice. If you would like to use JiT you will find the children's usernames and passwords to access JiT in the back of their reading records. Or, depending on which artist's styles you choose to combine, this lesson may be easier on **Microsoft Paint** or similar Paint program.

Aim

I can use a range of skills to create a piece of art.

- I can recall and use computer skills to produce my own piece of artwork.
- I can review the work of others and offer suggestions for improvement.

You have produced your own art using their ideas, but using computer programs to do this!

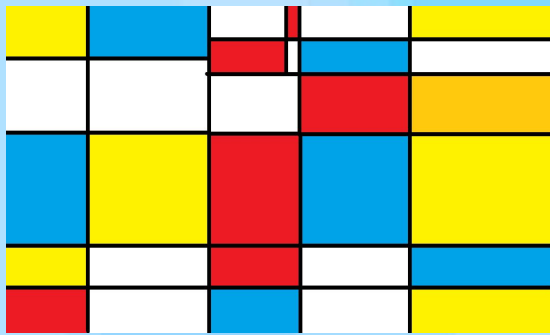
Have a look back at the work you have created - can you remember what skills you used to create each piece of work?

Which was the most challenging to make?

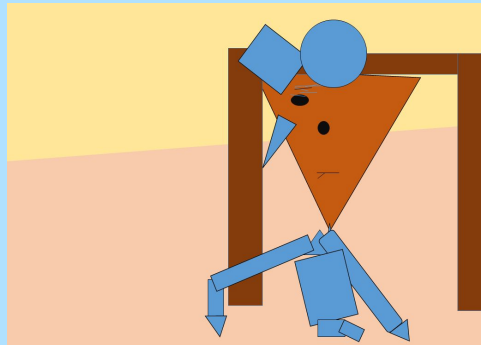
Which did you enjoy making the most?



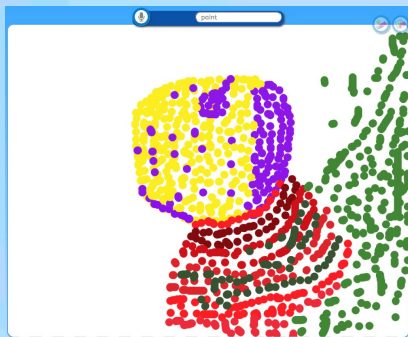


Mondrian's style of art using straight lines and blocks of primary colours - be careful to join the lines so you don't fill the entire page with the 'fill' tool!

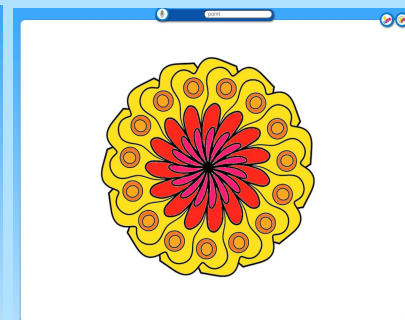
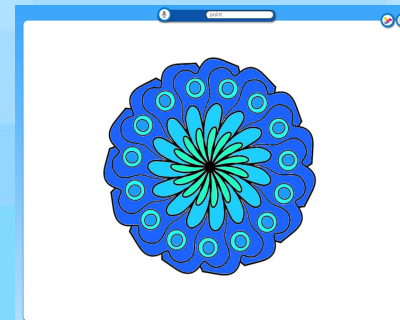
Picasso's style of art called 'Cubism' which uses lots of shapes to create a picture!



Warhol's style of art called 'Pop Art' where you can use the same picture more than once, but change the colours on each one, to make them stand out.



Georges Seurat's style of art called 'Pointillism' which uses lots of colourful dots - be careful to click for each dot so you don't end up with lines!



Monet's style of art called 'Impressionism' where he draws the same scene again and again but uses different colours and shades to create different moods!

It's All About You!

Now it is your turn to become a world famous artist.

You are going to combine some of the different skills that you have used, to produce your own original piece of artwork.

You need to think about:

What colours (and shades) are you going to use?

What mood or emotion will this create?



Be Selective

Don't make your work too complicated!

If you use too many different styles it becomes 'busy' and your eye won't know what to focus on.

If it is too fiddly, you may not be able to add colour exactly where you want it.

Too detailed a drawing will make it difficult to complete in time.

So...use a simple picture and 2 or 3 particular art techniques at most. Remember you can use 'Copy and Paste' and different colour combinations to make your image more complex!

Rave Reviews

Once an artist has produced a masterpiece, they like to show it off to the world to see what everyone thinks! Can you ask someone at home to review your artwork?.

It should include:

- Who made the artwork and what it is called;
- Which artists have influenced their style;
- What the artwork is capturing (is it a portrait of a famous person, a picture of a famous building?);
- How it makes you feel when you look at it;
- What you think they have done really well in their artwork.

Rave Reviews!
