Lesson 1

In this lesson the children will learn facts about the endangered African elephant.

They will be asked to do the short activity drawing and labelling an elephant.



Every year Burlington Infants try to help look after animals that are critically endangered.

The WWF is a charity that helps these animals.



It's sad but all these animals are endangered. There are many reasons why these animals are in danger. This week we will learn more about one of these animals.

Which animal will it be?



This animal likes to live in a large group.

They are very large.

They have a good memory.

They are grey.


This week we are learning about the African Elephant.

It is the largest land animal in the world. A male elephant, called a bull, can grow to be 3 metres tall!



Elephants live in herds, but male elephants leave the herd when they get too old and live by themselves.

Parts of an elephant



An Elephant's Trunk

An adult African elephant's nose is about 2 metres long. It is used for touching and grasping as well as smelling.

To keep cool, elephants spray water and dust on themselves with their trunks. It looks a bit like they are having a shower

If you look a little closer at an African elephant's trunk, you can see that it has 2 'fingers' on the end of it to pick things like leaves off the ground and trees.




An Elephant's Trunk

An elephant will raise its trunk in the air when it smells something interesting.

Trunks are used for making loud noises to roar as a warning and to show affection by wrapping them around another elephant's trunk.

Baby elephants suck their trunks as a sign of comfort just like humans suck their thumbs!



Food and Drink

When an elephant drinks, it can suck up to 9 litres of water up into its trunk which it then curls up and releases in to its mouth



They eat leaves, grass, roots and bits of tree bark.

An elephant can eat up to 135kg of food a day!



The numbers living in the wild are falling.

- Their habitat is being destroyed so they do not have enough space.
- People hunt and kill them for their ivory tusks.



These are tusks from an elephant.


People can carve ivory to make beautiful objects but this is illegal because people would rather see a beautiful elephant in the wild than have an object.

Lesson 2

I am going to write an acrostic poem about elephants.

Step 1 - Let's think of words and phrases about elephants.

Step 2 - Let's write the word elephant in capitals in a vertical line. Like this -

Noisey trumpeting elephants greet each other.


Too many are hunted for their beautiful, ivory tusks.
