Addition and Subtraction

Lesson 1 - Fact Families

In this lesson we are looking at fact families.

A fact family is a group of number sentences made up of the same numbers.

For example:

If you know that 2 + 3 = 5 you also know 3 + 2 = 5 5 - 2 = 3 and 5 - 3 = 2

Mr Johnson baked 3 cookies and 4 muffins.



Burlington Bear baked 2 cookies and 3 muffins.



Who baked more things?

Mr Johnson baked more. I know this because 3 + 4 = 7 which is greater than 2 + 3 which equals 5.

We would then write this as:

3 + 4 > 2 + 3

3 + 4 is greater than 2 + 3

This is one of the times when being really confident with your number bonds will help you.

For example:

If you know that 3 + 4 = 7, then you also know that 30 + 40 = 70.
